

Supply List for Quick Sketching 2

Pencil, your choice (I usually have an HB mechanical pencil with a big eraser)

Colored pencils (at least one dark color and a white, more if you like)

Pen—technical pen, drawing pen, fountain pen

Small set of watercolors—I much prefer artists' quality paints as they are richer, mix better, and are more saturated, but you can get some nice sets for not much money if you're just playing and learning. I've even bought a set in the kids' section from time to time!



Watercolor brushes—at least a ½" flat and #6 round (I like manmade hairs rather than sable, especially for sketching—much less expensive! You can find whole sets of brushes in the children's craft aisle, in bright colors. Fun to play with and VERY inexpensive! They're nice for traveling, too, though you really need a larger round brush.)

Waterbrushes—I find the largest one works well for most uses, since it really isn't very large. Niji works best for me, but Aquash and Holbein are nice. (Aquash brushes sometimes leak, though.)



Watercolor pencils—at least one dark color, but a set of 12 is nice. (I usually prefer to buy open stock, so I can choose my own, but sets are handy and often on sale.)

Drawing pad, sketchbook or journal (Aquabee makes a nice one that will take light washes)

Set of kids' crayons

China marker in white

Scrap of waxed paper
